<u>Statement from MP Stephen Ellis</u> Dangerous drug decriminalization program has put children at risk



Dr. Stephen Ellis, Conservative Shadow Minister for Health, and Laila Goodridge, Shadow Minister for Addictions, released the following statement on the acknowledgement by the Trudeau Liberals that their dangerous drug decriminalization program has put children at risk:

"The announcement is an admission by the Liberals that their failed drug policy has put children and families at risk.

"For years now, Justin Trudeau has flooded the streets with deadly drugs. When overdoses increased following the rollout of that policy, they doubled down and decriminalized hard drugs in British Columbia, leading to opioid deaths increasing even more. British Columbia streets have become less safe, and so have the places where our children play like playgrounds, wading pools and skate parks.

Even the areas around schools and daycares, which were already supposed to be kept free of drug use, have been victimized by the unprecedented levels of drug addiction that have resulted from the Liberal-NDP coalition's failing drug policy.

"Under his leadership, Justin Trudeau has allowed overdoses in British Columbia, where his reckless decriminalization policy applies, to increase by 351 per cent, while the street cost of dangerous drugs has dropped 70-95 per cent. The impact of Trudeau's failure has not only been felt by those suffering from addiction but also by families and children who are forced to live through the crime, chaos, drugs and disorder that Trudeau has brought to our communities.

"The announcement is a clear admission that decriminalization and the flooding of Canada's streets with taxpayer-funded opioids are failed policies that hurt addicts and communities. It also fails to go far enough to end the problems that the Liberal-NDP coalition has caused.

"Conservatives will end decriminalization of hard drugs, stop the taxpayer-funded handout of opioids, and invest money into treatment and recovery, ensuring Canadians will be able to bring their family, friends, and loved ones home drug-free."



90 per cent of young people doubt they will ever be able to afford a home



No matter where I go in Cumberland Colchester, whether it be at the War Memorial in Amherst, the Truro Famers Market, in blueberry country, even at the gas station filling up my car, the message is the same: Axe the Tax!

We know that the 16 cents per litre carbon tax invoked July 1 by the Trudeau government disproportionally affects us on the East Coast, because we are essentially a rural area and have to drive places. Most of us live in single-family dwellings and we heat our homes with furnace oil. People are afraid of the consequences that heating their homes in the upcoming winter will bring.

Conservatives have two priorities this fall. Reversing the housing catastrophe that Justin Trudeau has caused, and axing the Trudeau-NDP carbon tax to bring down the cost of food, gas and heat. Under Trudeau, housing costs have doubled, mortgages have doubled, down payments have doubled, rent has doubled.

For the first time in Canadian history nine out of 10 young Canadians don't believe they will ever own their own home.

A Conservative government would be committed to real economic growth! I receive phone calls and emails daily from concerned constituents. The solution is clear.

The Conservative Party will immediately axe the carbon tax, provide more money in your pockets, and will build homes not bureaucracy.

Ellis pushes CRA to act

The Canada Revenue Agency has corrected the Climate Action Incentive rural supplement to include all residents in Cumberland-Colchester, thanks to MP Stephen Ellis fighting for his constituents.

Bill C-323 update will be available in November

My Private Members Bill C-323 to amend the Excise Tax Act is under consideration in the House of Commons.

The Bill received second reading September 27 and was passed unanimously. It now is in committee for study.

I will have a full report in in November. Briefly, the bill would eliminate the GST and HST for mental health services administered by psychotherapists and clinical therapists.

Massage therapy may be added as an amendment.

The next step in the process is committee study.

Fighting for the Isthmus of Chignecto

We are lucky that Hurricane Lee's altered path did not create havoc on Nova Scotia's only land connection to the rest of Canada. It is essential to speak forcefully about the immediate need for a federal government project that would raise the dikes, eliminating what amounts to a clear and present danger to our economy and ways of life.

The federal and provincial governments are arguing about a cost-sharing agreement for a dike-raising program that is estimated to cost \$650 million, taking 10 years to complete.

This is not the path to follow, in my opinion.

The Isthmus of Chignecto dikes restoration and heightening has been turned into a political issue by the Liberal government, and this is wrong. Time is of the essence. \$35 billion worth of goods and services are transported annually by rail and highway along this narrow link to and from the rest of Canada.

On September 19, New Brunswick Senator Joe Quinn tabled a bill that would invoke section 92(10) of the Constitution, which allows the federal government to take jurisdiction of undertakings that are in the national interest.

This has precedent. In 2014, the federal government paid for a new Champlain Bridge in Montréal, as well as a new international bridge from Windsor to the United States. Senator Quinn's proposed legislation is called the 'Chignecto Isthmus Dikeland System Act'.

The key is to act immediately in a non-partisan manner, to ensure a safe and successful future, particularly for our constituents in Cumberland-Colchester.
